The first Thanksgiving in the United States was held at Plymouth in 1621. The feast was prompted by a good harvest and was attended by pilgrims and puritans. The Wampanoag Indians had taught them how to cultivate the land. And they were invited to the feast. It wasn't until 1660 that the harvest feast became an annual affair.

In 1777, the Continental Congress proclaimed the first national Thanksgiving, but it fell out of use by 1815, after which the celebration was limited to individual state observances. In 1863 Lincoln was convinced that a national Thanksgiving might serve a war-torn country. Finally, in 1941 the Congress permanently established the holiday as the 4th Thursday in November.



The Friends will be participating in the City's Festival of Trees and Tree Lighting event, which will take place December 3rd in Town Square Park from 5 to 7 p.m.

This is in conjunction with the City's annual Holiday celebration, which includes its usual "Santa run" throughout the city. A much-shortened parade will escort Santa's sleigh into the Park.

Due to a change in the city's plan for the annual Holiday Parade, the **Friends** will not be entering a float as we have done in the past. We are hoping the Holiday Parade will return next year in its usual format, using push carts—a unique idea—and if so, we will be putting out the word for volunteers to help make this happen. So stay tuned.

MEMORIES: THE MURRIETA SCHOOLS

On July 15, 1885, Mr. Buchanan built the first Murrieta one-room school, which cost \$2,200.00 Murrieta was not an incorporated city at that time. The school bell rang for the first time October 28, 1885. It not only rang for school, but was used for emergencies and to signal other important events. By 1900 there were enough students that an addition was built onto that first one-room school building. By 1918 there were 49 students and they needed a larger school In 1920, needing an even larger school, the old school was torn down and Murrieta Grammar School was built. It became, too small and Murrieta Elementary opened with 4 teachers, a teacher/principal and by 1965 there were 79 students. From this modest beginning, the city grew, became incorporated and Murrieta Valley Unified School District now encompasses 11 elementary schools, 4 middle schools and 4 high schools. This is a fascinating story. To get this whole history, not only of the school district, but all about Murrieta, too, pick up Jeanne Nelson's book at our Corner Bookstore and read all about it for yourself. It is wonderful reading!!



MURRIETA PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS

Dear Friends,

November is a time of giving thanks and I'd like to take this opportunity to say THANK YOU, **Friends**, for all you do to support the Library. The many hours volunteering in the bookstores and in the Library, fundraising, or promoting the Library to every new person you meet. We couldn't provide the excellent programs we do, nor purchase the wonderful collection we have, without YOU!

A few changes have taken place in the Library recently. Two of the three self-check machines have been moved to the lower counter facing the non-fiction area and the staff workstations that were at the lower counter are now facing the computer lab. This is the original configuration of the staff workstations and self-check machines, and the goal in making the move back is to be more customer friendly and allow for staff to assist patrons more easily with the self-check machines. The couches and chairs have also been moved back into the center of the lobby providing space for individuals to relax in and balance the area.

The language learning database, Mango, is no longer available and in its place is **Pronunciator**. Patrons seeking to learn a new language can go to the Library's web page under **E-Resources** and click on the **Learn a Language – Pronunciator link**.

Upcoming programs include the Murrieta and Temecula Valley **History Speaker Showcase with John Hunneman** on **Tuesday, November 1 at 6:00 p.m.** Mr. Hunneman, a journalist and columnist for over a quarter of a century covering the events in Riverside County, will talk about his knowledge of Murrieta and its changes through the years. Two new programs starting this fall are **Technology Help and ESL classes**. The Library now offers computer and mobile device assistance on a wide range of topics. Patrons can book a 30 minute, one-on-one session with staff on Mondays and Tuesdays between 11:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. Session appointments can be made at the Reference and Information Desk or by calling the Library at 304-2665 ext. 3. **ESL classes** will be held Mondays, November 14, 21, and 28 from 2:00 - 4:00 p.m. The free three week course is taught by Kevin Cole of Basic ESL. Other programs include **Genealogy Consulting** with Karl Weiler. Mr. Weiler offers general ancestry research help in the Heritage Room every fourth Monday of the month from 4:00 - 7:00 p.m. Mr. Weiler is a board member of the Temecula Genealogical Society and a staff member and trainer at the Murrieta Stake Family History Center. **Remembering 9/11** will be on **Saturday, November 5 at 1 p.m.**, with author and guest speaker, Bert Upson, who is a 9/11 survivor.

The holiday season will be here soon! The upcoming Library closures are: Friday, November 11, for Veterans' Day and Thursday and Friday, November 24 and 25, for Thanksgiving. December 25 and January 1 fall on a Sunday and additional days closed for December have not been determined.

THE STATUE OF LIBERTY

She celebrated her 130th birthday on October 28, 2016.

She was a beacon of feminism from day one. When women were banned from attending the statue's dedication on what was then Bedloe's Island, suffragists chartered a boat and held their



own ceremony in the nearby harbor, loudly proclaiming the hypocrisy of men, "erecting a Statue of Liberty embodied as a woman in a land where no woman has political liberty."

The seven rays on her crown are for each of the world's continents. Together, they give her a hat that weighs more than 1,000 pounds.

The cost of building her and her pedestal was more than \$500,000 — or at least \$12 million today.

At first, she was a dull copper brown. But as copper oxidizes, it develops a patina to protect from further deterioration. By 1906, she was green from head to toe which is a really great color.

She stands tall and proud and is the most heart-warming sight whether seen from land, air or sea.
