As a new board member and assuming the President's role, I am slowly learning

how the organization functions. I am very impressed with the dedication of individuals who put in many hours keeping things running smoothly. Most people don't realize how much work goes on behind the scenes with things like financial management, scheduling volunteers, internet sales, legal filing requirements, etc. We are running a not so small non-profit business. It will take me several months to come up to speed and I thank all of the people who have willingly given me their time for my introduction.

I have been volunteering at the Town Square store for six years. It is most enjoyable because the people who come to the store to buy books are very interesting and well read. The conversations with them are great.

After being chosen Board President, one of the first things I wanted to look at is the potential impact of e-books on the sale of print media. A review of sales over the past 6 years shows a slight gradual in-store decline at the Town Square store. 2013 showed a minor decline at the Corner store. The bright spot was that thanks to the efforts of Brian Youens for the Corner Store and Lori and Art Razo and Maggie Pilotte at Town Square, internet sales in 2013 were at a high point of approximately \$23,000 which more than offset the in-store sales declines. We will continue to monitor these trends in the year ahead.

Public Libraries still popular

Libraries are valued by an overwhelming majority of Americans, according to a new study.

The report, released Wednesday by the Pew Internet & American Life Project, said that 95% of Americans 16 and older say that libraries are important because of the opportunities and resources they provide, and because they promote literacy and a love of reading.

Pew surveyed more than 6,000 Americans in July and August in English and Spanish. The results show that most Americans believe libraries are important in their communities and do a good job at keeping up with technology.

Books remain most important—far more than Internet access. Eighty percent of respondents rated books and media either "very important" or "somewhat important."

Following in descending order were librarian assistance (76%), having a quiet, safe place (75%), research resources (72%) and programs for youth (69%). Programs for adults and use of Internet, computers and printers tied at 58%; while more than half of respondents valued help in applying for government services (53%) and help finding and applying for a job (51%).

"Women, African Americans and Hispanics, adults who live in lower-income households, and adults with lower levels of educational attainment are more likely than other groups to declare all the library services we asked about "very important," Pew reported.

MAGGIE PILOTTE — Our "Lady from Spain"

Maggie was born in Madrid, Spain; met and married Paul Pilotte, who was stationed there in the service, during World War II. Paul and Maggie came to the United States in 1970, settling first in San Bernardino and then moved to Murrieta in 1999. She became a member of the Friends soon after and has been continually active in one capacity or another since joining.

One of her major accomplishments was putting on very lucrative style shows, along with Pat Farmer and Linda Tomlin. These style shows always had a fun theme and

were so well received and so well attended that it was a big disappointment to everyone when we had to abandon this type of fundraiser due to prohibitive costs and limited choice of venues.



Putting on a style show took a year's planning, organizational skills, an eye for fashion and contacting various stores for garments to show. Incorporated with the style show

there was always a Silent Auction with donated prizes to be raffled. These too were big money makers and it was these types of fundraisers that enabled us to accumulate the \$100,000.00 we gave to our new Library when it opened in 2007 to purchase their complete Reference Collection.

Since then Maggie has not slowed down one bit. She managed the original Bookstore in the Murrieta Gateway Center when our first Library was situated in that same center. Maggie set up many of the basic procedures both Bookstores still follow. Maggie had to take a leave of absence when her beloved Paul became ill. Others took over that store (it took 3 alternating managers to replace her) but when our new Library opened in Town Square and a bookstore was included in the plans, Maggie took charge and became the manager of the Town Square store. She has since been joined by Laurie Razo as co-manager. She also assists Laurie and Art Razo doing Internet sales.

Over time, Maggie served on the Friends' board from the year 2000 to 2005. She was elected Vice President and Ways and Means in 2005. She served one year in this job and then was off the board for one year. She came back on

the board in 2007 thru 2009, again elected as Vice President and continued to co-manage the Town Square Bookstore. She still sits on the Friends' board as an Advisory Director.

Maggie took over as Program Chairman when Eleanor Newhard stepped down and has done a fabulous job in this function, bringing us interesting authors, musical programs and other speakers of note. Judy Bain was her co-chair for a couple of years and since then Judy Call has been her cochair. We appreciate the time and effort that goes into acquiring these entertaining and educational programs. It adds much to our monthly meetings.

She also initiated a Book Discussion Group that first met in the little building at the Community Center and is still going strong.

So, we take our hat off to Maggie Pilotte for the many years she has devoted to the Friends of the Murrieta Library in its mission to support our Murrieta Public Library. A huge **THANK YOU**, Maggie. You have waited a long time for this well-deserved and long overdue recognition.


