Early Warning is the second novel in a planned trilogy about the Langdon family mostly set in mid-century America. The patriarch has died and the five children have scattered, each of the children following a different path in a rapidly changing world. The novel follows their lives through the 40's to the 80's.

The characters are richly drawn as we meet the second generation of the Langdon family and become engrossed in their decisions that affect their lives and their children's. We become aware through them of the political, social and sexual issues of the times in which they live. Some Luck begins the saga of the Langdon family, Early Warning is the second, and by the time the third is published the saga will span a century.

Jane Smiley is a Pulitzer Prize-winning author. She has written over sixteen novels. I have read the first two in the trilogy and enjoyed them. I look forward to the third.

You can't help but be pulled in by their lively performance and how they obviously care for each other and for OM. We can't wait to see how they wow the judges at the World Finals!"
