BOOK REVIEW By Sharon Hunter

Americanah, is a national best-selling novel by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, a Nigerian who divides her time between Nigeria and the United States. It is a love story of Ifemelu and Obinze, but also a commentary on immigration, American dreams, and the shifting meanings of skin color. Ifemelu earns a living by creating a blog in which she records her observations about the differences living in Nigeria and America. Many of her observations are funny and insightful. Her writing contains lush description, and her characters are finely drawn, of interest to the reader.

This is beautifully written, worthy of your reading.

Dear Friends,

It's hard to believe that summer is over and autumn is already here! I must begin by giving a heartfelt thank-you for all your support because we would not be able to



put on the wonderful summer programs without your continued sponsorship! The Friends of The Murrieta Library's generous donation of \$10,000 enabled the staff to present 18 programs that had a total attendance of over 1,100 community members. I would also like to give a special thank-you to two sponsors whose contribution also made a huge difference. Laurie Blanscet, DO, pledged up to \$1,200 towards the **Teen Read for A Reason** component this summer and the Teens read a total of 121,153 pages, surpassing their goal, which earned \$1,200 for the Animal Friends of the Valleys! Also, a big thank-you to Tony Nanci, of Anthony's Lounge and Ristorante, who donated over 50 certificates for his restaurant totaling more than \$1,000. This helped make our Adult Summer Reading Program our most successful one yet! Of course we also received many other donations from the local business community, to which we also give our utmost appreciation! Without these generous donations, the Library would not be able to provide the level of programs and services that we currently provide for our community.

A big thank you to Carol Carson for her generous donation of \$2,500 to go toward the Library's need for Nook and LeapPad tablets. As you recall, in the July/August **Booknotes**, there was a request and donation form for additional funding for Nook and LeapPad tablets. These items are very popular and the Library is excited to offer additional devices for the Community to check out.

The Library also received a \$1,500 donation in June from the Temecula Valley Woman's Club. This donation will be used to purchased LeapPad tablets and apps geared for pre-school learners. The donation will also be used for two family programs; one with animals and one on science. We greatly appreciate the Temecula Valley Woman's Club for their continued support of Murrieta Public Library programs and services.

NEW LAW—Takes effect September 14th and it is known as the Three Feet for Safety Act. The law will require a motorist passing a bicycle traveling in the same direction to pass with no less than three feet between any part of the bicycle or rider. When three feet is not possible, the vehicle must slow to a reasonable and prudent speed, then pass only when no danger exists for the bicyclist. Failing to do so can incur a fine, whether or not a collision occurs.

Bicyclists must abide by laws, too. Staying as far to the right while being as safe as possible; riding single file when necessary; following same rules as vehicle drivers.

The Library has some exciting fall programs starting in September. Youth Services Librarian, Allison Eagans, is focusing fall programming on a statewide initiative known as **ELF**, **Early Learning with Families**, providing library services to young children ages 0-5, their families and caregivers. The Children's Department has developed family focused, child-centric, and developmentally appropriate programs and services that support family strengths and nurture young children's bodies, minds and spirits. Upcoming Teen programs include PSAT and SAT workshops and practice tests and Graveyard Tales. Adults will have an opportunity to learn about the Santa Rosa Plateau and all the hidden resources it has to offer, and Ghost Hunting with the Southern California Paranormal Detectives will be in October. In the past, we have had the fall/winter programs in the Community Services Department Recreation Guide; however, in the spirit of saving money, the Library programs will only be published in the spring/ summer Recreation Guide this fiscal year.

The upgrade to the Polaris Software System was completed in mid-August. The week before completion, the patron catalog went into offline mode and while items could be checked out, items were not able to be checked back in. Due to an enormous backlog created by being offline for the week, the Library closed on Friday, August 15th so staff could check in materials and get them back onto the shelves. The Library re-opened on August 16th and all normal patron transactions were made available.

Lastly, I want to reiterate how much the staff, the community and I do so appreciate all the work the Friends of the Murrieta Library do for our organization; we simply could not exist without you. The almost \$50,000 donation we received from you in July will be used for Collection Development and for programs and supplies for the current fiscal year. I hope you know how much your efforts are needed and appreciated. Thank you!
