

She called her mother, Stephanie, who jumped in her car and brought it right over. Needless to say, Eric and Michelle were not only delighted but amazed! Also, by way of a sort of P.S., Kirsten and her sister Lauren have been a true blessing this summer, pitching in to help me catch up on a variety of projects. The day following this fun time, the Abernathy girls helped make a display of books we were putting on sale for a quarter each. They were mostly a large number of elementary school level hardback "picture" books which had been withdrawn from the library because they didn't circulate. They were nice books, but not the much more popular chapter books the kids prefer, so they had been on our shelves for some time. There were three plus boxes. and the girls marked them and organized them on a display cart, replete with bright signs saving "Please take me home," etc. Not half an hour after the display was set up, a school teacher came in and her jaw dropped as soon as she saw the books. It happened that she had taught fourth grade, but will be teaching second grade this year. Thus, she was shopping for her classroom library. She ended up buying all the ones we had out – more than thirty dollars' worth – and virtually floated out of the store a very happy customer. Interestingly, too, she lives here, but teaches in Palm Springs. I think it's great that we gave money to the library to buy the books, now made a little more money selling them to her, and those same books will be enriching children in another city.

When Carol asked me to do a book review this month for the BookNotes, I immediately thought of a book that has only been on the book seller's shelves since July and has already had more reviews than you can count.

When the news first broke that Harper Lee had a "new" book, about to be published, a prequel to her Pulitzer Prize winning, *To Kill A Mocking Bird*, weren't we all excited? Imagine having the opportunity to own a First Edition of this famous author's work. I dreamed of where I'd place it in my personal library, at what age I would read it with my grandchildren, or when the public schools might put it on their required reading list. I am one, among millions (I'm guessing) who purchased a copy of "Go Set A Watchman" the very day of its release...and then spent 2 days reading it...oh, my!

The various critics' reviews are mixed—some not favorable and others kinder. It is certainly a different take on the plot than her original. For instance, Cara Erica writes, "This captures the era so brilliantly, as the political unrest and civil tensions brought out both the best and the worst in people."

Robert Crum writes...this book shows Lee stuck on the race politics of the Deep South like a feather on a tar barrel." "Go Set A Watchman" has a certain promise, but not much more. Harper Lee herself seems to know this, describing it as a pretty decent effort.""

I can only encourage each of you to go ahead, take a chance, and read the book. Be reminded again there are parts of our history that are ugly and just plain wrong but remembering this might keep us from repeating our mistakes.

The Time Between by Karen White is a novel about two generations of sisters and their secrets set in South Carolina. The characters are finely drawn. Each sister has her own guilt and grief.

The description is beautiful. As the book cover states," it is a tale of love and loss, of betrayal and redemption, and of a harrowing family secret buried in the upheaval of the Second World War." The author has written over ten novels, many of them receiving a four star rating. I highly recommend this book.

MURRIETA PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS

Dear Friends.

I hope you all had a wonderful and fun summer! Once again, the Library presented a very successful Summer Reading Program. The theme this year was Read to the Rhythm! and included a variety of programs such as: Bubble Mania; David Cousin: Comedy Juggling; Mad Science; Make It & Take It Pizza; Adventures In Improv; Sushilicious and Summer Cupcake Decorating. There truly was something for everyone this summer. The children logged 630,480 minutes of reading time. The Teens read 152,320 pages for the Teen component; Read for a Reason, and raised \$1,000 for Animal Friends of the Valleys and \$1,000 for Paws for Law, a foundation dedicated to supporting the Murrieta Police Department's K9 unit. A big thank you to our sponsors for the Teen component, Carol Carson and SoCalGas, for their generous donations. Thank you also to the Friends of the Murrieta Library for their continued support and \$10,000 donation for performers and prizes. In addition, a thank you to the local businesses who donated reading incentives. The Library could not provide such a fantastic Summer Reading Program without the donations received from the Friends, sponsors and our local businesses. As usual, the staff did an amazing job implementing the Summer Reading Program and training the multitude of volunteers it takes to help us run the program.

Fall/winter program development is underway and programs will begin soon. Upcoming Children's programs include *LEGO Club*, *Play & Learn*, *Spy Club* and *Half Sleep Over*. The Teens will have an opportunity to attend several *PSAT and SAT Workshops and Practice Tests* and a financial seminar - *GoTo College Without Going Broke*. Adult programs include, *History of Murrieta Talk*, *Gut and Brain Connection* and *Mixed Media Card Making*. To help bolster our programming, the Library received a \$700 donation from the Temecula Valley Woman's Club. The donation will be used for two family programs; one with animals and one on science.
