



\*\*LIBRARY DONATIONS: In the continuing goal of supporting our Murrieta Public Library, we wrote seven checks in June for summer programs totaling \$1,825.00. In July we will present the Library with four more checks totaling \$1,100.00 for additional performers for more of their summer programs. Plus, giving the Library a check for \$7,300.00 to purchase supplies for all these various programs.

The Friends will also give the Library \$50,000.00 from our Collection Development Fund to purchase books and other materials for their collection. This is an annual donation that we have done over the years, supplementing the \$100,000.00 we gave them initially for the new Library that opened in March of 2007. This enabled them to purchase their complete reference collection.

Much of this money came from style shows we have done in the past; silent auctions and other fundraisers. Now we depend mostly on our bookstores to generate funds for donations to the Library. Your membership dues are a big help, too. We hope you realize how important the Friends organization is to our Library and will continue to urge new members to join and spread the word about our fabulous bookstores. We have a legacy

## "To e or not to e"

Naturally, a frequent topic of conversation at the Corner store is whether e-books will totally supplant "real" books. The vast majority, including yours truly, think that there is room for both. E-books are convenient, especially when travelling, but to book lovers, there's nothing like holding a book while reading. To a person, when expressing that opinion, people will hold out their hands like an open book. There is a tangible and emotional connection that goes beyond the actual words written in the pages.

One might think that once children have grown up with the computer, and in particular with e-books, they will think that "real" books are just something from the olden days. I think that what will keep them in touch with paper books are the warm memories of mother and grandmother holding them on their lap or reading to them in bed from a lovely picture book. Even if they spend most of their reading time electronically, that physical experience of holding a real book will literally evoke the experience that went beyond the actual story. They will then want to pass that wonderful experience on to their children, and so forth down the generations. My favorite childhood story was *The Wind in the Willows*, and I can still picture Mr. Toad racing along in his motor-car. I have given that book to many little ones over the years so their parents can pass on the wonderful experience.

Just like hearing a song will rerun a video in your head and evoke the emotions connected to some past moment in time, so too can holding a book. Ray Bradbury said that when holding a book, "you are holding the sands of Egypt." There is a human continuum in the word printed on paper—or papyrus, as the case may be. We all have special books that bring back wonderful memories of worlds and times beyond our actual experience. Added to that can often be what I call "flyleaf stories." My favorite personal flyleaf story is in my mother's copy of Gone With the Wind (unfortunately, not an early enough printing to be valuable monetarily). She lent it to all the ladies in the neighborhood, and each signed her name as she read it. We had a great neighborhood (in Hawthorne, CA), and these women were all like aunts to me. So just going down the list of signatures brings back a flood of memories and warm feelings.

Then I have a book given to my great uncle Willie "as a souvenir of First Communion" from "Father Power, Holy Cross Church [San Francisco], July 2, 1893." I never knew my uncle Willie, but from the stories I've heard, I'm sure he would *not* have been able to read Father's gift of *The Poetical Works of Thomas Moore* at the age of seven – or probably at any age! So reading that always makes me laugh and remember the many stories of Uncle Willie's adventures.

Also, holding a book that old in your hands evokes a sense of wonder that you can touch something held not only by Uncle Willie, but also by all the other family members through the generations who have treasured it and passed it on to the next. They may be physically gone, but I am connected to them with this book. I'm thinking that an e-book could never have the life of a paper and ink book.

I'm sure many of you have book memories and flyleaf stories of you own, and I was thinking that you might like to share them. If you e-mail me at <a href="mailto:nancyd111@verizon.net">nancyd111@verizon.net</a>, I can do a follow-up piece for Booknotes.

P.S. I already had mentally written this piece in my mind (as I am wont to do) when I read a piece in the paper: according to a Pew Research survey, 81% of consumers say that a printed book is better for reading to a child than an e-book. See, I told ya so!

## MURRIETA PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS

Dear Friends,

Summer Reading is once again a huge hit with the children, teens and adults of our community! The Magic of Titou was a very popular program as was Pudding Paint and

Sushilicious. There is more fun to be had so check out our web page at <a href="www.murrietalibrary.info">www.murrietalibrary.info</a> for program information. We can't THANK YOU enough for your continued support and generous donations that allow us to provide the wonderful programs and prizes that make Summer Reading such a great success. A special THANK YOU to Carol Carson for the donation for the Teen program - Read for a Reason...Read for the Homeless Animals of the Valleys. It is certainly motivating a lot of teens to read this summer!

On June 18, 2013, the Murrieta City Council approved the Library's Operating Budget for fiscal years 2013/2014 and 2014/2015. The Library budget for fiscal year 2013/14 totals \$1,957,015 and 2014/15 totals \$2,033,541. The budget remains status quo with the exception of an additional \$20,000 for collection development in the second fiscal year. The Library funding is almost entirely dependent on property tax which comprises ninety percent of the revenue received. The Library Fund receives about one and one half cents of every dollar paid in ad valorem property tax. This equates to about \$37 per year for a home valued at \$250,000. To balance the new budgets, the Library will use \$255,679 of the Library's economic contingency funds in 2013/14 and \$303,955 in 2014/15.

We recently received one-time Library Services and Technology Act funding in the amount of \$10,000 to purchase new print materials in six collection areas. The name of the program is Books4U and the six collection areas to purchase in are as follows:

Early Literacy/Parenting
Workforce Development
Non-English Language/ESL
Reference - CORE~ Legal~ Ready
Children's/Teen
Popular Fiction

This additional money will allow the Library to have multiple copies of bestsellers and enhance the collection in several areas.
