Orphan's Tale

The Orphan's Tale by Pam Jenoff is a story of love and redemption, of heroism during Nazi Germany. Noa the central character is a sixteen year old girl who becomes pregnant by a Nazi soldier. She is cast out by her father, and her baby is taken away by the Nazis. She rescues a baby left to die by the Nazis and flees. As the story unfolds, she is taken in by a circus and must learn to be an aerialist so that she blends in with the circus for safety. Excerpts from, **READ MY LIPS.....**

....by David McCullough.....Nothing ever invented can give you a bigger life than a book.

"Once upon a time in the dead of winter in the Dakota Territory, Theodore Roosevelt took off in a makeshift boat down the Little Missouri River in pursuit of thieves who had stolen his prized rowboat. After several days, he caught up and got the draw on them with his trusty Winchester, at which point they surrendered. Then Roosevelt set off to haul the thieves cross-country to justice. They headed across the snow-covered wastes of the Badlands to the jail at Dickinson, and Roosevelt walked the entire 40 miles or so—an astonishing feat. But what makes it especially memorable is that during that time he managed to read *Anna Karenina*.

Read for life, all your life. Nothing ever invented provides such sustenance, such infinite reward for time spent, as a good book. Read to your heart's content. Let one book lead to another. They nearly always do. Take up a great author and read everything he or she has written. Read about places you've never been. Read books that changed history. And when you read a book you love—a book you feel has enlarged the experience of being alive, a book that 'lights the fire'—then spread the word."

Let Your Fingers Do The Counting

Experts in education and cognition now believe that using your fingers to do math is not only a perfectly good idea but may even help children become superior students.

It certainly makes sense. When children count on their fingers, they take an abstract concept———mathematics——and translate it into the most basic, tangible form. In fact, neurobiologists believe that the brain is hardwired to “see” a representation of our fingers even when we aren’t literally counting on them.

The connection between finger use and math ability has been demonstrated on old-fashioned math tests as well. With their eyes closed, first graders were asked to identify which of their fingers a researcher was touching, along with other finger-related exercises. A year later, the students who scored highest on the finger-ID questions consistently scored higher on a math test.

Researchers at Stanford also stress that some students simply learn better using visual tools rather than by memorizing the multiplication tables and reciting them as quickly as possible. “When I introduce math to my Stanford students, I say, ‘I don’t care about speed; in fact I am unimpressed by those who finish quickly.’” says Jo Boaler, PhD, a professor of math at Stanford.

Boaler believes that anyone—at any age——will improve math ability by improving basic finger dexterity.

MURRIETA PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS

Dear Friends,

Happy New Year! Hope you enjoyed the holidays and are ready for 2018. The Library is looking forward to another successful year of providing programs and other services to the community. In the new year, the Library will continue to host ESL classes for adults. There is a beginner class and an advanced/intermediate class. On January 22, there will be a **Makerspace Day** where there will be hands-on, child-directed activities where kids can explore, create and tinker. There will be old printers, computers and other electronics for the kids to take apart and investigate how they work. As usual, we have many programs planned for all ages throughout the year. A unique circulating collection will make a debut in January. We have purchased 10 musical instruments that will be available for checkout. We will begin checking out to adults only and will review the policy and make changes if necessary. Instruments will be checked out for two weeks and no renewals or holds may be placed on the instruments. Instruments in the collection consist of a double row tambourine, Casio keyboard, bongo drum set, ukulele, acoustic guitar, vinyl record player, mini accordion, and xylophone, among others.

We recently received a generous donation of \$2,700 from the Temecula Valley Woman's Club. The money will be used to purchase a new Storytime rug, Launchpads and a poster printer. Launchpads are pre-loaded tablets, designed with a simple, easy-to-use interface and are very durable. Launchpads come pre-loaded with a variety of subjects and we will be purchasing STEM themed Launchpads. The poster printer will allow us to market and advertise our programs in a more professional manner. Currently, staff has to piece together several 8 ½ X 11 sheets of paper to create a large poster, that is then placed on an easel. We also received a \$1,500 donation from Southern Californian Edison. This donation will be used to buy additional Launchpads for children and audiobooks for adults.

Coming in February is the annual "**Love Your Library**" Food for Fines program. This month-long celebration of school, public, and private libraries of all types is a time for everyone, especially library support groups, to recognize the value of libraries and to work to assure that the Nation's libraries will continue to serve. In recognition of this celebration, the Murrieta Library will waive \$1.00 of fines for each non-perishable, nutritious pre-packaged food item brought to the Library's Circulation Desk. The maximum amount of fines waived is \$10.00. This is a great way to reduce or eliminate the fines from your library account and help those in the community who need assistance. The donations will be given to the Murrieta United Methodist Church. Library closures are: Mondays, January 15—Martin Luther King, Jr.; February 19—Presidents' Day.

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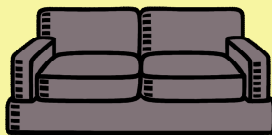
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
