



Little Free Library at Murrieta Elementary School

In August of 2021 the Friends of the Murrieta Library donated a Little Free Library "book house" to Murrieta Elementary School. One of our members donated the book house and local artist Bonnie Martland painted and decorated it with pictures of children and books.

Children may get a book whenever they choose. Each month a FOML volunteer restocks the Little Free Library using children's books donated by both of our bookstores: the Corner Store and the Town Square Store.

We thank all of our patrons who have donated children's books in the past and want you to know that some are being shared with the local community.

MURRIETA PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS

Dear Friends,

I hope this newsletter finds you well and healthy as we welcome spring. Before I give an update about the Library, I would first like to recognize Agnes Rita, Supervising Librarian, for successfully completing her tenure as Interim Library Manager. Without hesitating, she jumped into the interim role and provided the leadership to keep the Library moving forward through the continuing COVID pandemic.

Due to the latest omicron surge in January, the Library and all City facilities were closed for in-person services on January 7 through January 31. During the closure, the Library offered Grab & Go Services, where patrons were able to pick up materials and various craft kits. 367 take-home craft kits were distributed and 4,744 items were checked out.

In the month of February, the Circulation Services Department conducted the Food for Fines program in honor of Love Your Library month. Library patrons were able to donate a pre-packaged food item to waive \$1 per item, up to \$15. This program not only reduces the financial barrier for patrons to access the Library, but it also has a positive impact for those who are experiencing food insecurity. The donations will be given to the Murrieta United Methodist Church's food pantry.

The Adult Services Department received a \$15,000 grant from the California State Library for the Zip Books program, which provides library users speedy access to books that are not available at the Library. The requested book is shipped directly to the patron's home and then added to the Library's collection once returned. The Zip Books request form is available at bit.ly/murzipbooks and will be available until the funds have been used or by June 30, 2022.

Western Science Center Passes, Purchased by the Friends of the Murrieta Library

Think about libraries and people checking out books come to mind. There are always others sitting in a quiet space, reading newspapers and magazines.

That's so yesterday. Libraries still offer those services, of course, but now they're so much more. The Murrieta Public Library is offering the latest example of this transformation with its new program of sharing passes to the Western Science Center in Hemet. A group of four can use the passes for a week, visiting as often as they want, said Kesia Estrada, children's librarian. There is already a waiting list of 13 people for the passes.

"The museum passes have been flying off of our shelves," she said. Having visited the museum several times on school field trips as a teacher, I can see why the passes are popular. For example, there is Snapshots in Time, which, according to the museum website, offers a hands-on look at fossil discoveries made during the excavation for nearby Diamond Valley Lake. Visitors can meet Max the mastodon, make fossils and come "face to face with the natural history of the Inland Empire," the site states.

Reading about it is great, but touching it is a whole new dimension, all thanks to a library, as well as the Friends of the Murrieta Library, which paid the \$2,400 cost for a year of the passes. "Libraries and museums have a similar vision," Estrada said. "We both are agents of democracies. Our objective is to preserve history and provide arts, culture and education to the public."

Estrada got the idea for museum passes from San Diego County's library system. "Libraries are growing and evolving with the times," she said. "Books and literacy continue to be our main objectives. However, there is always a goal to innovate and educate."

Rita Nastri, President of the Friends of the Murrieta Library, said her organization was happy to help. "I cannot imagine the look on a little child's face seeing the giant woolly mammoth for the first time," she said.

I've seen it as a teacher and it is awesome.

Kathryn Miller, of the Murrieta staff, has started a library where patrons can check out seeds by planting them and then bringing some back to share.

Speaking of history, this sounds like a Johnny Appleseed moment. A "library of things" is also being developed by Ashley Bigay and Ryan Jenkins. Users can check out electric guitars, ukuleles, story times kits and other goodies. The library also hosted a community showcase at which local kids performed. "The students of Murrieta are very talented," Estrada said.

Nastri, of the Murrieta library group, is a senior who's been reading books for more than a half century. "There are too many books and not enough time," she said of her life's hobby. She has been involved with library support groups for about 20 years, first in Pennsylvania and now locally. She loves what libraries have become in her lifetime. "It's wonderful because it serves the needs of the community," she said. "There is so much going on. I don't know how they keep track of it all."
