
We are very pleased to present for your enjoyment, local author **ROB CRISELL**

BOOK REVIEW

THE DRY

By Jane Harper

The Dry is a debut novel set in the Australian outback during a long draught. The sense of dry heat and its effects on the characters is so true to setting and tone, the reader is placed immediately in the story.

This is a first-rate murder mystery. The story opens with Aaron Falk, a Federal Agent, returning to his home town to attend the funeral of an old friend, his wife and his son. He plans to stay only for the weekend but winds up staying to help the local police investigate the crime. Is it murder or suicide? To complicate matters, Aaron was accused twenty years earlier of killing a friend. Again, was her death murder or suicide? And, if these were murders, who committed them? As is stated on the fly leaf, "sometimes it's the smallest of towns that hide the biggest of secrets."

As a first novel the book became an international best seller. The tightly woven story builds, keeping the reader guessing. See if you can guess what happened and who is responsible.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF MURRIETA

The early native people were hunters and gatherers living near the Murrieta Creek, Cole Canyon and other areas within the valley.

In 1872 Juan Murrieta drove 8,000 sheep into the valley onto the Temecula Rancho which he owned with financial partners. When the partnership dissolved, Murrieta retained the northern portion of the Rancho.

When the railroad came to the valley in 1882, Murrieta granted the California Southern Railroad a right of way across his land. In 1935 the railroad was replaced by Highway 395 to allow roadside diners, motels and service stations to spring up along Washington Avenue and Ivy Street.

Murrieta's first post office opened July 28, 1885 and in 1902 Fritz Guenther established the Murrieta Hot Springs Resort. (Note: that post office building is still at the corner of Washington and C, presently occupied by Empire Design)

In the 1950s Highway 395 shifted east and farming soon gave way to large horse ranches where race horses were raised and trained. In the 1970s and 1980s, the construction of Interstate 15 carved a wide path through the Murrieta Valley. Today, Interstates 15 and 215 freeways continue to bring new families and new job opportunities to a city whose population has grown to over 116,000 people.

Dear Friends -

The Library is heading into some busy months. May is the month when staff put the finishing touches on summer programs. May is also the month for school library tours. There are 16 kindergarten and second grade tours scheduled as well as outreach events staff will attend offsite. May is the perfect time for teachers to fill gaps in classroom assignment time with a positive and productive field trip and gives the Library staff the perfect audience to promote summer programs.

Some changes have been made to the annual summer reading program and it is now called the **Summer Reading Challenge.** The program continues to be for all ages and when a participant completes the challenge, by reading six books, they will receive a book bag or backpack with a variety of coupons. The Summer Reading Challenge begins June 18 and runs through July 28. The theme this year is **Reading Takes You Everywhere!** A big THANK YOU to YOU, the **Friends of the Murrieta Library**, for the generous donation of \$5,500 that will be used to purchase 4,000 finale prizes of backpacks and book bags.

The one thing that remains the same is change... Santa Clarita Public Library will no longer be part of the shared system beginning July 1. Santa Clarita Library has been operated by LS&S and Santa Clarita decided not to renew their contract with LS&S and make the library a City department. Effective April 2:

Inland libraries will no longer honor Santa Clarita library cards

Inland patrons will no longer be able to place holds on Santa Clarita materials. Inland patrons will no longer be able to select Santa Clarita as a hold pick-up location.

Inland patrons who have Santa Clarita materials checked out will not be able to renew those items

Inland patrons will no longer see Santa Clarita materials in online catalog search results

The courier will continue to run as scheduled to all Inland libraries, including Santa Clarita, to return materials through July 1

Thank you for your continued support and the many hours you put in volunteering at the Bookstores! Have a wonderful summer!




