A LITTLE HISTORY.....

Friends of the Murrieta Library began as an official organization in 1996, with the goal of bringing a Library to Murrieta. In April 1999, the Murrieta Public Library opened in a beautifully converted bank building in the Murrieta Gateway Center on Los Alamos.

Continuing the tradition of independent trail blazing the Friends opened a freestanding Bookstore in an 1100 square foot space across from the Library. In January 2004, the store relocated to its present location—a larger space. Volunteers, including many faithful customers, pitched in to help move to the new store. In order to pay for purchasing bookcases, Manager Nancy, initiated "Adopt a Bookcase Plaque:" with a memory name inscribed on it. It was very successful and paid for all the bookcases, supplies for building the workroom, paint for the entire store and all other expenses. New carpet was donated by several local businesses and many hours were spent setting up the bookcases and then organizing and shelving all the books.

The store was soon bursting at its seams — we even had to rent a storage unit to keep donated books in until we needed them and had to go back and forth with boxes of books. When our lease came up for renewal in 2009, the Board voted to expand into space next to us that was vacated. The landlord cut through the wall, patched and painted the opening at no cost to the Friends and the store blossomed into now 3100 square feet, allowing for a whole non-fiction section and a delightful children's section. This was taken over by Joann Callahan, in memory of losing a 5 year old grandniece, and became Cheyenne's Corner with its own carpeting, shelving, small tables and chairs all donated by Joann and friend. It has been an exciting, much-used special area of the Bookstore.

Two display cases were donated by Lifetime members Marvin and Ruth Zepede and completely renovated by Complete Coach Works. The expansion also allowed the fiction section to spread out and be better displayed.

Nancy holds a tri-annual sidewalk sale that has become well-known and very well attended, making it a great extra fundraising project. Beautiful bright blue book bags with our logo emblazoned on them are sold but are given free to purchases of \$25.00 or more at one time. Gift certificates can be purchased and make wonderful gifts especially to give children who love to come in and "spend their own money."

When the big new Library opened in 2007, the Town Square Bookstore had its Grand Opening there, which provided not only added income but also "bookending" our community with access to quality books on both sides of Murrieta.

We are most fortunate to have these two "Barnes and Noble" quality used Bookstores in Murrieta. We draw from all the surrounding areas, bringing customers to Murrieta that may not come into our city otherwise.

ALL OF THIS is only accomplished with the help of our faithful, dedicated volunteer GEMS.

THE PERFECT BRAIN FOOD

(Excerpt from Reader's Digest)

Reading isn't just filling your head — it's nourishing it. The cheapest, easiest, and most time-tested way to sharpen your brain is right in front of your face. It's called **Reading.**

"Typically when you read, you have more time to think. Reading gives you a unique pause button for comprehension and insight. By and large, with oral language—when you watch a film or listen to a tape—you don't press pause," says Maryanne Wolf, EdD, UCLA Center for Dyslexia, Diverse Learners. And the benefits of reading continue long after you've put down that great book. Called a shadow activity, almost like a muscle memory. The very nature of reading encourages the brain to work harder and better.

OK, it's hardly surprising that the language part of the brain gets a workout from reading. But reading also energizes the region responsible for motor activity. When it is reading about a physical activity, the neurons that control that activity get busy as well. You may not be riding a horse when you're reading *Seabiscuit*, but your brain acts as if it is. And the more parts of your brain that get a workout, the better it is for your overall cognitive performance.

Close literary reading in particular gives your brain a major workout. MRI scans showed reading deep into a Jane Austen novel showed an increase in blood flowing to areas of the brain that control both cognitive and executive function, as opposed to more limited effects from more leisurely reading.

A book can help a poor or dyslexic reader. One hundred hours of remedial reading classes significantly improved the quality of their brains' white matter. Researchers conclusion: The brains of these children had begun to rewire themselves in ways that could benefit the entire brain, not only the reading-centric temporal cortex.

So turn off your phone and your computer, set aside a good hour or two and just **READ!**

Before We Were Yours

"Loved the characters" "Easy read" "Well developed story" "A clear depiction of life in those times" All of these comments and more gave the novel *Before We Were Yours* a five star rating by the majority of the members in my reading group.

Five children live on a shanty boat during the depression. Their parents can barely provide for them, but they live a loving relationship. Queenie, their mother is pregnant again, but has a difficult birthing and has to go to a hospital. She dies, along with the twin babies, and the father mistakenly signs the children away to a horrible orphanage. The experiences the siblings have and how they cope is the focus of the novel. Of the five, three sisters manage to stay in touch and maintain a close relationship as adults.

The need for child protection laws to be put in place became evident during the historical period of the times. For example, the children in the orphanage were not always orphans, but were stolen outside while playing and then were sold.


