

NIGHT ROAD By Kristin Hannah

If you are looking for a relaxing, pleasant read Kristin Hannah's novel NIGHT ROAD is a good choice. Miles and Jude are parents of twins, Zach and Mia who are very unlike. Zach is Mr. popularity in everything he does, and Mia is a shy, introspective girl. Enter a new girl Lexi who becomes best friends with Mia and is more or less taken in by the family. The threesome are close friends. Their inter- personal relationships are the focus of the story. Also, the mother Jude's parenting is an issue. The close family begins to unravel in the twins senior year of high school.

In all of Hannah's novels she focuses on women and their relationships. Without giving away the book, there is a dark problem that causes major changes in all the characters. Although the story is somewhat predictable, the changes in the characters make the novel an interesting read. Hannah also writes very descriptively which makes for pleasant reading.

Hannah has written over twelve books. I have read and enjoyed all of them.

Corona at the Corner

I have always thought of the Friends Corner Bookstore as being surrounded by a corona, a warm glow emanating from being surrounded by thousands of books, wonderful volunteers, and the smiles of happy customers. Then the virus struck: *abibliophobia* (the fear of running out of books to read). The day before we closed, the phone rang off the hook, with panicked customers asking "Are you open?" "Are you open?" "Are you open?" "One of the customers said that her husband told her to "call your happy place." We ended up making \$516.00, a record day!

As a small bit of relief for the virus, I put several boxes of twenty-five and fifty-cent books, as well as a box of children's books, outside one of our doors, which has a mail slot built in. The sign says "Honor by the Book," and to put the money through the slot. Inside there's a plastic tub on the floor to catch the cash, and in the three weeks we've had it, we've made over thirty dollars, representing quite a few happy customers. The week before the holiday I added kids' Easter books. A customer posted on NEXTDOOR: "As I was walking my dog today ... I saw the most awesome sight. The Friends of the Library Store [sic] had children's Easter themed books for sale... It put a smile on my face. I hope someone with little ones would buy books for their Easter baskets." And they did! ——One neighbor said she would check it out.

I have been glad to have a "home away from home" at the Bookstore, and have been using the quiet time to catch up on pricing. Cathy Cagle and Kelli-Ann Almeida have been taking books home to price. Mary Lou Rosczyk has been coming in to shelve the priced books. But the biggest shout-out goes to Greg Eberhardt and daughter Laurie who have taken home, cleaned and priced ALL of the non-fiction books (I have a picture of the empty shelves to prove it!), as well as DVD's CD's, Blue Dots, and other odds and ends. We are talking *hundreds* of books!

I never thought as the Friends Historian that I would be documenting the closure of the Library and both bookstores. Hopefully, that sad reality will soon become history.

MURRIETA PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS

...from Elise Malkowski, Deputy Director of Library Services

Dear Friends,

I hope this newsletter finds you all well and healthy. We have been closed since March 14 and the staff misses seeing and assisting all of the patrons in person. Staff is split into an A shift and B shift so we are not all in the Library working at the same time. We telecommute two days and are in the Library two days and telecommute on our Friday rotation. We have been very busy and I'd like to share some of the things we've been working on since the closure:

- Book drops remain open and we are checking in items after they have been quarantined for 72 hours. Since being closed, we've checked in 3,422 items.
- Allison is doing virtual Storytime via Facebook and getting over 250 views.
- We've added **Enki California Digital Library** to our web page. It's a collection of ebooks that are easy to download and you can read them on your computer, phone or tablet.
- Staff are utilizing the 3D printer machine that was purchased with a donation from Southern California Edison and making ear guards for face masks and face straps. We have made 40 so far and will be giving them to health care workers and seniors in healthcare facilities.
- We have registered 82 new patrons who can use their new library cards online. We have sent out 44 Zip Books and another 30 should be delivered soon.
- We've shifted the non-fiction books and made some other changes so things will look a little bit different on the Adult Reference side of the Library.
- We have a reopening committee and they are developing a plan for when the time comes that we can open to the public, although we know it will not be as it was right before we closed.

It's been amazing to see the shift in how staff work and the creativity that has come from this pandemic. Staff dug right in and I'm so proud of the way they have embraced delivering virtual services. We hope to see you all soon!


