

MURRIETA PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS

Dear Friends,

I hope everyone had a safe and wonderful summer! Before we dive into our Summer Reading Challenge statistics, I would like to impart the news that we bid a fond farewell to our Deputy Director of Library Services, Elise Malkowski, in July. She officially retired after 32 years of working in libraries, 16 of those at the Murrieta Public Library. Elise encouraged and supported the Library staff with their ideas that allowed them to create wonderful programs for children, teens, adults, and people with special abilities and disabilities. Under her leadership, we saw an increase of 50% (2012 vs. 2019) in Library programs and attendance.

*2020 numbers are mostly from virtual programs and take-home kits.

Thanks to the generosity of the Friends of the Murrieta Library, we were able to provide these programs to the community for free.

We are still recruiting for the Library Manager position (<u>www.governmentjobs.com/careers/murrieta</u>) and Agnes Rita will be filling in as the Interim Library Manager for the time being.

Like last year, our Summer Reading Challenge was completely online and participants from all ages were able to pick their own book from our Book Fair. The Book Fair was generously sponsored by the Friends of the Murrieta Library. We had a 45% increase in participation this year compared to the 2020 Summer Reading Challenge. Here are the Summer Reading Challenge statistics:

1,349 participants 4,903 books read 5,486 badges earned 482 book reviews 694 books handed out

During the Summer Reading Challenge we also:

Checked out 41,038 items Checked in 24,663 items Placed 3,574 items on hold Added 1,024 items to the Library collection Registered 483 new Library patrons Answered 7,689 reference questions Handed out 2,286 take-home kits for all ages

The Four WindsBy Kristin Hannah

The Four Winds is a novel that richly brings to life the Great Depression and the Dust Bowl periods experienced in our country in the 1930's Millions are out of work and drought has devastated the Great Plains. The central character, Elsa, has an agonizing decision to make: whether to stay on the farm she has grown to love or leave it behind and go west to California. Elsa is faced with many harsh, difficult decisions in this novel about family ties, perseverance, women's friendships and fortitude.

Kristin has written over 20 novels, and I have known Kristin since she wrote her second book. I was her docent when she attended the Literary Guild Conference and later when the Woman's Club book group held a phone conference with her. Each of her novels are "stand-alones". She meticulously researches her books. Currently one of them. Firefly Lane, is a television series on Netflix, but my favorites are Home Front and The Great Alone. If you are looking for a good read, you can't go wrong with one of her books.

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CORNER BOOKSTORE SIDEWALK SALE



Member News

Condolences to the Marvin Zepede family. Marvin's services were held at the Laurel Cemetery on August 19th. Marvin and Ruth are original Lifetime members and have been strong supporters of the Friends in many ways, as well as contributing to the city of Murrieta before and since its inception as a city. Marvin was on the Murrieta Cityhood committee and is one of our Founding Fathers. A proclamation acknowledging this and his other contributions is planned to be read at a future upcoming City Council meeting.

LABOR DAY—September 6th

Labor Day is considered the unofficial last day of summer. It is a time to celebrate the benefits we enjoy at our jobs—including weekends off. The concept of American workers taking days off dates back to 1791, when a group of carpenters in the city of Philadelphia went on strike to demand a shorter work week (10 hour days to be exact). It wasn't until 1836 that workers starting demanding 8 hour work days. So nine to five doesn't sound so bad after all.

Statistic show that Americans work longer hours than citizens of most other countries—137 more hours per year than Japan, 260 more per year than the U.K., and 499 more than France. And our productivity is high—400% higher than 1950, to be exact..

It is the reason workers can say TGIF.

9/11—This September 11th the National September 11 Memorial and Museum located at the World Trade Center will lead the nation in commemorating the 20th anniversary of the September 11, 2001 terror attacks that took the lives of 2,977 men, women and children in New York, Arlington, Va and near Shanksville, Pa.

The focus of the commemoration will be the reading of the names by the family in person. The program will commence at 8:30 a.m. Houses of worship are asked to toll their bells. During the ceremony six moments of silence will be observed. Family members only are allowed. The ceremony is expected to end at 1:00 p.m. At sundown, the annual "Tribute of Light" will once again illuminate the sky in commemoration of these attacks.

Twenty years after the attacks that changed our world forever, the 9/11 Memorial and Museum stands as a sacred symbol of fortitude and resilience in the face of unimaginable tragedy.

The Museum also offers educational activities and lesson plans for students 3 to 12 that address the 9/11 attacks, their ongoing repercussions and the history of the World Trade Center.

Murrieta's New Amphitheater

This newly complete amphitheater is the largest of its type in the area. Some of the state of the art features of which Murrieta is very proud are:

- The tiered seating can accommodate approximately 750 with lawn seating for an additional 5,000 to 6,000 people.
- Stage right and left wings, allowing it to expand the space for more extensive programs.
- The site includes bathrooms, storage, and a server room onsite for WIFI.

National Read A Book Day




